July 27 Is Date Of Oakland Hills Summer Aquacade

Water-ballet, latest sport to be sanctioned by the A.A.U. will be on display Saturday, July 27, when the Chicago Towne Club brings its top-rated water-ballet group to the Oakland Hills Country club's annual Summer Aquacade.

Water-ballet is considered to be a true ballet form and the Chicago group has held the national championship since the sport was first recognized by the A.A.U. and an intricate scoring system devised. Miss Polly Wessler is premier danseuse and choreographer.

Clarence Pinkerton, D.A.C. swimming coach, has arranged for a cross section of the nation's best swimmers and divers to appear and the Oakland Hills exhibition will be, in effect, a warm-up for the national swimming and diving contests at San Diego to be held the following week.

Among those scheduled to appear are Bobby Stone, former OSU diving champion and considered to be the best exhibition diver in the world; Walter Reis, Chicago, called by Coach Pinkerton "the best swimmer in the United States" and holder of the 100 and 200 yards and the 100 meters records; Bill Frew, Detroit, national sprint champion; Bobby Gardner, Detroit, Virginia Fitzgerald, Chicago, and Joan Kessler of the University of Detroit.

The Oakland Hills exhibition will get under way at 9 p. m. Saturday.
