Residents of Southfield township will be interested to know that the long-looked-for building code was adopted by the Township Board at last week's meeting in the Berg road township hall.

The code will be known as Ordinance 119 as provided in Article 18 of the Public Acts of Michigan, 1945. Hitherto the township had no protection against shoddy construction and other undesirable features, such as fire hazards through faulty wiring and chimney construction. The code as published according to law will go into effect thirty days from its adoption or on August 18. C. E. Stephens is director of the Southfield Township board.

Effective August 1, Southfield Township will pay Detroit prices for water, or an advance of \$18. Leonard J. 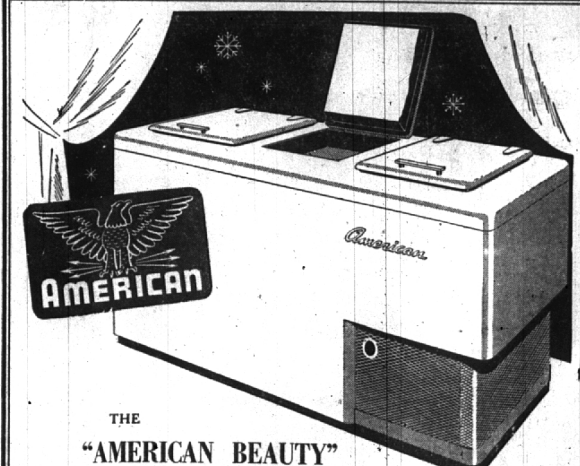
