### Applicants Have Till July 1 to Apply for Admission to U. of M.

No applications for admission to the Fall Semester of 1946-47 will be accepted by the University of Michigan after July 1, except for three special groups. It has been announced by Dr. Frank E. Robbins, assistant to the president.

The three groups for which exception will be made are:

1. Veterans from the State of Michigan who may wish to enter or return and whose discharge from the services will not enable them to apply earlier.
2. Non-resident veterans who were enrolled before entering upon military service and are now discharged in time to apply earlier; and
3. Graduate students who may be required as teaching fellows and assistants.

Dr. Robbins emphasized that qualified applicants, whether veteran or non-veteran, from within the State of Michigan will not be refused admission if they apply by July 1.

Stuart Capron, of Oxford, Michigan, veterans' counselor for the northern portion of Oakland County, is temporarily filling the position of Birmingham veterans' counselor until a permanent appointment is made to fill the vacancy caused by the June 1 resignation of Jack Thomas.

### Parents Are Asked To Keep Kids Off Railway Property

Birmingham police will cooperate with Michigan railroad police officials this summer in preventing "vacationing" Birmingham school children from playing around railroad right-of-ways, Birmingham Chief of Police John P. Hackett said.

This week the state's railroad police, aided by the Michigan Railroads Association, are sending out pleas to parents, educators, judges, P-TAs and service clubs, city and country police for aid in keeping children off railroad property, particularly during the summer vacation.

It is feared there will be a sharp rise in the current epidemic of juvenile trespassing on railroad property and of mischievous acts by youngsters that have resulted in some child deaths and injuries among employees, passengers and the juveniles themselves.

Although there has been much juvenile trespassing on railroad property in Birmingham, in the past few weeks our department has noticed no vandalism around the "Trunk depot," Chief Hackett said.

### Break Lights

"Lights on the passenger platform and underneath the windows have been the recent subject of a number of children's pranks. And a number of telegraph pole insulators have been reported broken," said Birmingham children generally do not acquire railroad property as a playground," he said.

J. P. Anspach, president of the Michigan Railroad Police Association, said, "These youngsters are not vicious, but their mischievous records, merely mischievous, poorly trained kids."

Chief Hackett emphasized the danger any youngster faced while playing along a railroad. "A slip could cost a child's life. We ask that parents be particularly aware of where their children play this summer, and do everything to discourage them from frequenting railroad right-of-ways."

### Oakland County RED CROSS NEWS

Record enrollment is expected at the Red Cross program sponsored by the Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, at 18 beaches and pools of the county, according to Mark Smith, chairman of water safety. Each year many individuals drown in Oakland County lakes. A study of these accidents shows that many are avoidable. A few swimming water safety is frequently a guarantee against such accidents.

All phases of the Red Cross program will be taught from beginning swimming to Senior Life Saving, and certificates will be awarded to those successfully completing the tests. The program will be conducted by Russell H. Palmer, who will be assisted by Jeanette Partridge and Gwen Kemp. The program will begin the week of June 17, continuing for eight weeks.

### ORCHARD LAKE PUBLIC FISHING SITE—RULES AND REGULATIONS

(Revised under authority of Act 11, Public Act of 1931, as amended.)

IT SHALL BE UNLAWFUL FOR ANY PERSON TO:

1. To occupy this site without having in possession an unexpired fishing license issued by the Bureau of Fish and Game, or to be accompanied by a child.
2. To establish a camp on this site.
3. To anchor or tie up boats, motorized or otherwise, or to drive cars on the ice of Orchard Lake.
4. To remove or change clothing within the site or on premises.
5. To build open fires on the site.
6. To leave cans, bottles, paper, rubbish, refuse, or garbage on the grounds.
7. To remove or injure trees, shrubs, plants, or other natural growth, soil, clay, or other minerals from the site.
8. To remove game, or injure any building, equipment, improvement, or structure on the site.
9. To place or distribute advertising signs or literature on the site.
10. To occupy this site during the time when Orchard Lake is closed to all fishing.

These rules and regulations shall be in force and effect from June 1, 1946.

PENALTY  
Violation of any rule or failure to perform any act set forth in the rules shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$10 and costs, or imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 30 days, or by both such imprisonment in the discretion of the court.
