Busy Days Are Ahead For All Girl Scout Campers

"When you see girls bicycling along the road these summer mornings, perhaps with nosebag (pitch) along, probably in shorts and some of those amusing 'who'd ever have thought it' shirttail outfits the young misses affect, you are probably witnessing their expeditions to their own private haven—the Girl Scout Camp," said Mrs. Lewis Thornton of Crooks road, publicity chairman of the Oakland County Girl Scouts Committee.

"These camps are promoted and leaders trained under the direction of the Oakland County Girl Scout Committee, which is one of the agencies participating in the Oakland County War Fund," continued Mrs. Thornton.

"Mrs. Edward Eastlander, with offices in the Birmingham Community House, is the professional Girl Scout worker who directs and stimulates this work, but the extent of it is limited only by the number of public-spirited citizens who can be found willing to donate enough of their time to take the required short leaders' course and to conduct the camps. Suitable sites also are necessary, and the standards are rigid from the safety standpoint of water and toilet facilities.

"There are several types of these camps of which probably the most popular, where facilities are available, is the Day Camp. This is usually a five-day camp, conducted from about 9 to 4 in the afternoon; the noon meal is usually cooked out of doors. This program is identical, where swimming is available, with the established camps, and the day is spent in handicraft, games, sometimes golf and archery, outdoor cooking, and of course, when the camp is situated on a lake, swimming. There is a small charge, \$1, to cover costs.

"After the safety of the project has been assured, Scout rules require that there be a building or tent set up in an infirmary, and that there be nursing service on hand."

Day camps, as well as the other types of Girl Scout camps, are based on a fun-recreational program, with nature as a background, she said.

"Troop camping is another popular type of summer camping; standards here are just as rigid, but it is much less ambitious from the standpoint of size. It is camping lasting from one to several days, and is for individual troops. A day hike is not strictly camping at all, but it is a planned program according to Girl Scout standards and a most worthwhile project."

Mrs. Thornton further stated that, established camping is, of course, the grand prize of all to the Girl Scout, and an established camp of our own is the final goal toward which the Committee is working. Funds are not available at this time for such a project.

"Through cooperation with other established camps, however, 213 girls from Oakland County outside of Pontiac and Royal Oak, which have their own arrangements in camping, have been placed in the following camps: Camp of the Hills, Jackson; Cedar Lake, Ann Arbor; Sherwood, Pontiac; and Camp O' Fair Winds, Genesee County.

"Day camps this year are being held at the following places: Birmingham, Brownie and Intermediate; Farmington, Brownie and Intermediate; Clarencenville; Southfield and Rochester."
