

Annual Detroit Horse Show Opens Today at Bloomfield Open Hunt Club

Song Recital Given By Mary Gardner

Following her graduation from the Eastman School of Music at Rochester, N. Y., two weeks ago, Mary Gardner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Gardner of Aspen road, presented a song recital for an enthusiastic audience at the Community House last Sunday afternoon at 3:30.

Her program was well chosen to suit the lovely, lyric quality of her voice. There was a pleasing variety ranging from early-Italian and old English songs and airs to two modern numbers by Charles Griffes which she sang with distinction. French and German composers were also included.

Her voice showed excellent training, and she possesses an unusually pleasing stage presence. She was admirably accompanied by Edith M. Mitchell.

Assisting artist was Mrs. Aaron Simmons of Trenton, Mich., pianist and member of the Detroit Bureau of the Michigan Federation of Music Clubs. She contributed two groups—one of eighteenth century music, the second of modern. Her interpretation of Debussy's "La Cathédrale engloutie" was particularly outstanding, as was also her encore of "Clair de Lune."

On Sunday gates will open at 12:30 and continue until the 17 championship events have been completed.

One of the outstanding events of the Horse Show will be an old-fashioned hunt, which will be enacted in former style hunting regalia by Mrs. Graham J. 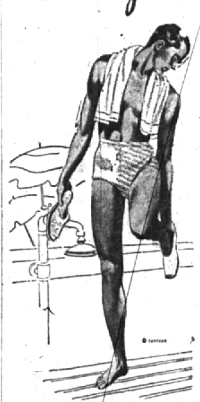
Oakland County Tag Day Will Be June 29
