

### Church Holds 1st Annual Peacetime Meeting In 5 Years

Announcement of the appointment of Luther Phillips Cudworth, C. S. B., of Boston, as President of the Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts, was made today by the Christian Science Board of Directors.

Mr. Cudworth at various times has served as Purchasing Agent of the Christian Science Publishing Society, as Director of Christian Science Welfare Activities in Portsmouth (New Hampshire) Naval Prison, Committee on Publications for the State of Oregon, and as First Reader of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, Marshfield, Massachusetts.

He is a native of Iowa, receiving his early education in the public schools of St. Paul, Minnesota, and later attending Harvard University and the College of Business Administration. Before devoting his entire time to Christian Science activities, he was associated with the printing and publishing business in St. Paul, and with the Portland, Oregon, Railway, Light and Power Company.

He received instruction in the Normal class of the Board of Education in 1934, and since that time has taught classes in Christian Science annually.

Until all responsible government heads are made to realize that the motto of a nation's true greatness is the spiritual sure of its people, rather than its physical resources, there can be no end to the conflict of materially mental forces that precipitated World War II. The Christian Science Board of Directors today held the Annual Meeting of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts today.

The time has come, the Directors affirmed, when representatives of all social and religious systems are being called upon to give something more concrete than promises, preachments, and pious platitudes to sustain the faith of our fellow men and to provide for a lasting peace.

If these systems are to survive, declared the official spokesmen of the world-embracing Christian Science movement, they must furnish proof that the ideals for which they stand can be made practical use in advancing the cultural, economic and spiritual welfare of all races.

This statement from the Directors was given before thousands of Christians gathered in the first Peacetime Annual Meeting in five years, many of whom came from countries long absent from the world by war. They brought with them vital lessons from the crucible of the past, and emphasized the Director's contention that "the supreme duty of statesmen and churchmen in this crucial hour is to use every means at their command to prevent another world conflict and to bind up the unhealed wounds left by the last one."

Continuing on these lines, the Directors insisted that "there is no room in the church for politics, and a democratic system of government there is no room in politics for the church. There is, however, always room in politics for the moral leadership of the church."

Dr. Hartman A. Lichtwardt, medical director of the Women's Hospital in Detroit, and president of the Detroit branch of the Foreign Policy Association and chairman of the Detroit World Study Council, was honored by the combined boards of these two organizations which met in Birmingham last Sunday at the Community Center.

Mrs. Charles Shain, vice-president of the joint boards of directors, presided over the tribute to Dr. Lichtwardt who spent fourteen pre-war years in Iran and more recently has been associated with the Henry Ford Hospital.

In his response, Dr. Lichtwardt said, "If there ever was a time in our history when we needed to rid ourselves of intolerance and ignorance in world affairs, now is the time. Our foreign policy is vitally important now that our country has taken its responsible place in the United Nations."

### Will Inform Public

"The Foreign Policy Association has pooled its resources with the Detroit World Study Council for concerted action, will continue to be a reliable source of information in analyzing and interpreting world problems through research, publications, discussion meetings, institutes on current issues and radio programs. To this end the Carnegie Foundation has presented the Council with a grant of \$2,000 for the current year."

Walter E. Gleason, junior administration assistant of the informational service of the Detroit Public Schools serving as Executive Secretary of the combined Boards of Directors, reported on the Student United Nations Conference in Detroit at the Ruckham Building May 16.

The impact of this endeavor was felt in Birmingham through the participation of the students at the Baldwin High School in a similar project interpreting the work of the Security Council. In Birmingham the project was directly sponsored by the Birmingham Branch of the Security Council of Yesters.

### People of the Nation Must Rid Themselves Of Intolerance and Ignorance Concerning World Affairs, Doctor Declares to Groups

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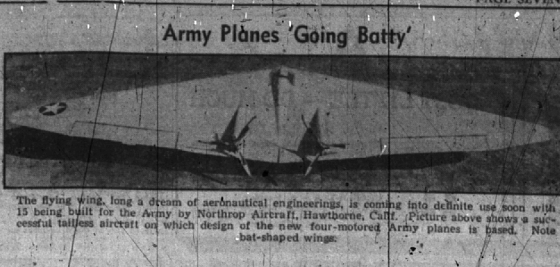
