Sugar Stamp No. 9 Is Now Good For Canning Supplies

The official word has come to Birmingham that spare stamp No. 9 in War Ration Book Four and in the Sugar Ration Book may now be redeemed at the grocer. Beginning March 11, 1946, this stamp became good for five pounds of sugar to be used only for home canning and preserving of fruits, fruit juices or vegetables for use, and for making products such as pickles, relishes, catsup, mince-meat and for curing meat (for use). This stamp will be valid until October 3, 1946.

A consumer who applied for and received an allotment of sugar in 1946 for producing products for sale may, prior to Nov. 1, 1946, apply for an allotment of sugar to be used for canning fruits and fruit juices for sale, and for producing jams, jellies, preserves, marmalades of fruit butters for sale if the finished product is to be produced in a "kitchen."

April 12 and 13 Are the Dates of Cranbrook's Play

Scheduled for presentation on April 12 and 13 will be "Beggar on Horseback," Ergasteria's seventeenth annual spring show. The Kaufman-Connelly play, one of the earliest pieces of expressionism in the theatre, and now billed as a "comedy-fantasy," will be under the direction of Carl G. Woonberger, director of Ergasteria and the Summer Theatre School at Cranbrook. Girls in the production will be drawn from the senior class at Kingswood.

Casting will be completed in a short while, according to Mr. Woonberger, and elaborate efforts are being made to adapt the play, with its multitudes of scenes and properties to a single set with the extensive use of lights and stage trickery. Staging will be under the direction of Peter Storor, Ergasteria stage manager.

Included in "Beggar on Horseback" is an elaborate dream pantomime, which is based on an old fairy tale. The director has composed a special score for this. Choreography will be under the direction of Noel Baker, and the dancers will be Pat Phillips, Elaine Newhall and Irene Barr, all of Kingswood.
