Mrs. L. K. Daniels and Mrs. Frank Werneken Teach Home Nursing

Mrs. L. K. Daniels of Birmingham and Mrs. Frank Werneken of Bloomfield Hills are teaching the Red Cross home nursing program in Baldwin High School. At the present time high schools throughout the county have shown much interest in this Red Cross activity. Other classes are meeting in Clawson, Royal Oak, Mason High School, Lake Orion, Orford, Pontiac and Farmington. Mrs. Hugh Lincoln is chairman of the Home Nursing service of the Oakland County Chapter American Red Cross.

Each instructor is an enrolled Red Cross nurse and the committee responsible for the program is of the opinion that graduate nurses who give this service are making an outstanding contribution to the community. Home Economics teachers instruct fifty-five hours of theory and the graduates nurses teach nursing procedure.

Mrs. Howard Robinson of Berkeley is co-chairman of the committee and is responsible for the organization of classes in Southern Oakland County. Miss Marjorie Johnson of the Oakland county health department assists greatly with the program. As the advice and suggestions of the medical profession are considered very valuable by the committee, Mrs. Ralph Robinson of Pontiac is in charge of office detail and purchasing.

Furniture Design Is Topic Of Talk By John L. Kolle

John L. Kolle, interior decorator from the J. L. Hudson Co. in Detroit spoke last Wednesday before the A.A.U.W. sponsored Interior Decorating Class. In his talk Mr. Kolle outlined the social, religious and political influences upon furniture design and illustrated how furniture is a reflection of the mode of life of the people.

"It is to the early Egyptians," he said, "that we owe most of our present day furniture designs since they drew directly upon nature for most of their designs, some of which were inspired by animals in motion as well as the petals of the lotus blossom."

"Throughout the centuries their designs have been copied by the most famous furniture designers of their era; Sheraton and Hepplewhite used Pompeian designs which were copied from the Egyptians and the Adam Brothers were not really furniture designers at all but drew freely upon classic or Pompeian themes."

"Present day furniture also shows the influence of religious motifs originating in Italy and brought to many corners of the world by returning pilgrims."

"France has been the source of inspiration for many decades for furniture design and it is well known not only for its Gothic influence but for the artificial styles reflecting the general luxuriousness of the French Court and the more utilitarian influence of Marie Antoinette, which was a reaction against the extravagance of her predecessors."

"Victorian furniture, influenced by the long mourning period of its ruler, was ornate, depressing in shape and color and overcluttered with detail. Such a style is entirely unsuited to present day living and destructive to mentality."

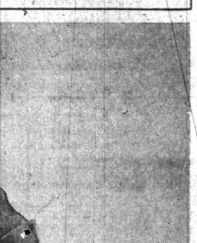
