Wayne University And Its Work To High-12 Club

The members of Birmingham High Twelve Club heard Dr. David Henry, president of Wayne University, discuss the university and its effect upon the life of the community it reaches, at the club meeting Monday night.

He defined Wayne University as a great civic or urban institution as compared to the land grant type of college serving approximately 1,200 students annually and touching indirectly the lives of 200,000 people. This type of institution has come forward in the last 30 years to help make it possible for students to live at home and attend school. In as much as 75 per cent of the students work their way through and as few wish to borrow or so call mortgage their future, they here have the advantage of a large industrial area from which they may earn while learning. "He also mentioned that much thought and help is being given returned veterans."

"Unless closely connected with the university," he stated, "many are not familiar with the scope of its activities in that it is accredited by membership in the North Central Association and the Association of American Universities and is ranked one of the top 100 in the country. It is surpassed only among municipal universities by the several colleges supported by the City of New York. It serves three distinct groups, adults, workers who wish upgrading in their specific fields, and of course full time students."

"The main building is the old Detroit High School with fifty-four surrounding houses being used. Only recently the state legislature has granted a considerable sum for an expansion program." He stated that in the days ahead he hoped for improved programs and greater understanding of problems so greater service could be rendered. Sixty-four members and three guests gave close attention to his talk.
