

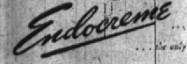
### Guest Speaker At Woman's Union Is Rev. R. J. Hanson

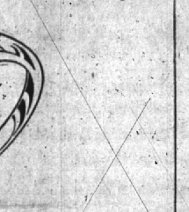

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### A Recent Bride

Mrs. L. E. Colgrove of Birmingham is chairman of the newly organized committee for the 1946 Red Cross Fund Campaign of the Oakland County Chapter.

Mrs. Colgrove and a large committee of active workers have sorted and packaged a total amount of 424,050 supplies. The articles consist of posters and counter cards which are displayed in places of business and industry; contributors' lists; membership receipt cards which are given to each contributor of a dollar or more; label tabs and window emblems which are given to every contributor; workers' identification cards which are worn by each worker; information leaflets; pamphlets and instruction sheets for workers.

This committee has been active for weeks in order that supplies might be ready for the 3,500 workers who are active in the campaign. After supplies are sorted and packaged it is necessary to group them into the required number for townships and special divisions. Mrs. Robert Pack, Pontiac, is co-chairman of the campaign. ### League Of Women Voters Giving Lot Of Study To Control Of Atomic Energy

"One method used by the League of Women Voters to encourage citizen participation in government is to urge all citizens to express their opinions in writing to their Congressmen when great national issues are before Congress for action," stated local League president, Mrs. H. J. Livernance in explaining that on such occasions League members write their Congressmen, in accordance with the League stand, if they personally support it, taken after much study and research and a sounding of local Leagues on the question.

"A hotly contested issue in point, active in Congressional committee at this moment, is federal atomic energy control, whether it should be vested in military or in civilian hands," stated Mrs. R. S. Plexico, chairman of the League's international relations committee, directing local League study of this problem.

"Favor McMahon Bill" "Michigan's own senator, Arthur Vandenberg, is a member of the special senate committee on atomic energy, of which the chairman is Senator Brian McMahon, now preparing a bill for its control.

"The National League, represented by Mrs. Harold Stone, testified before this committee recently in favor of the main provisions of the McMahon Bill (S1717) because it contains such safeguards as a controlling civilian agency reporting directly to the President. The League feels that it must be stressed that atomic energy should be controlled solely by the federal government in the public interest.

"The League has opposed the May-Johnson Bill, (S1463) because it could result in domination by the military of atomic energy. In words of our national League president, Miss Anna Lord Strauss, expressing the League views: "If the military was the present bitterly fought struggle for control of the atomic energy agency we shall be serving justice on the world that we are beginning an armament race of hitherto undreamed of intensity. Civilian control must be established if the U. S. is to be able to take leadership in preventing an atomic armaments race."

"Write Vandenberg" "This week local League members have been writing Senator Vandenberg, as a member of the McMahon committee, urging that a bill be presented to Congress along the lines suggested by the McMahon Bill.
