

### Detroit Attorney Tells Hi-12 Club About War Causes

The Birmingham High-Twelve club Monday evening had for its guest speaker Louis A. Komjathy, Detroit attorney, who spoke on the present-day troubles in Europe. His topic was "This Is Your Peace, Brother." Herbert Wood introduced the speaker.

Mr. Komjathy was born in Czechoslovakia and received his early education there and in Budapest, coming to the United States where he furthered his study, graduating from the University of Pittsburgh and the Detroit College of Law. He says he became an American citizen and is thoroughly imbued with the ideals of America and the democratic principles.

"We in the United States are somewhat handicapped by not always understanding the European Situation or knowing the thinking of the peoples over there," he stated. There are certain basic facts we must recognize if we are to avoid a path leading to a "Third World War." Among the points he made was that Europe has four times our population over the same area, divided into 34 language groups and five religious groups. This has a tendency to cause constant wrangling for position with one or another entering as the controlling group and each playing a game of "power politics," and where each nation thinks itself in the ascendancy as the "master race," causing eternal strife. He declared, "Even now, with so many of our soldiers boys returning and a quarter million gold and silver stars on our windows reminding us of our sacrifices, your statesmanship is not of the highest order so that we could enter into such situations which would compromise us considerably."

His own early education was such he said, that even after coming to America it took three years to clear his mind of the "superiority" which was taught over there.
