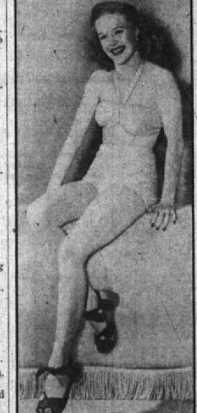
Mrs. Vera Hirlund Is Director of Planned Parenthood League

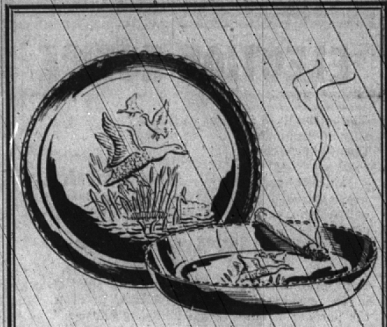
