A series of "Story-hours" for children of pre-school age has been started at Baldwin Public Library. The series is limited tentatively to six weeks and scheduled for Wednesday mornings at 10:30.
The stories, told by Miss Charlotte Squires, are short and simple, suited to children between the ages of four and seven.

Cranbrook Offers Summer Institute For Entire Family
Announcement has been made this week of the newly organized Cranbrook Summer Institute which will offer a six weeks program of instruction and recreation which will appeal to the entire family.
The desire to make their facilities more generally available to the entire community has prompted the heads of the various Cranbrook institutions to combine their resources resulting in the organization of the Cranbrook Summer Institute.
The Institute will begin on June 24 and run through August 2, Monday through Friday mornings, from 9 to 12. The morning program is mainly for children. An evening program with classes for adults is also included. With few exceptions, instructors and supervisors will be regular staff members of the Cranbrook Schools.
Directors named:
Miss Grace A. Fry, director of the Cranbrook Summer Institute; and William Schultz, Jr., director of the Cranbrook Summer School of the Theatre which will again be in charge of Carl G. Wagonberger.
Nursery and kindergarten activities will be held at Christ Church Cranbrook and the Brookside School playgrounds will be used. Children of ages three, four, and five will make up this group.
A summer play school, including swimming, will be offered to both boys and girls ages six to nine. The playgrounds of Cranbrook and Kingswood schools will be used and swimming will be in the outdoor pools below the Jomah Fountain at the Cranbrook Academy of Art. Red Cross certified swimming instructors will be in charge of this group as well as other age groups.
For older boys and girls, a program of arts and crafts is to be available for boys, and weaving, drawing and painting, and ceramics for girls. The art studios at both Cranbrook and Kingswood schools will be used. Swimmers will be in charge of this group as well as other age groups.
An adult program in the evening consists of weaving, silver work, ceramics, drawing and painting, music appreciation, and study of modern art, photography, astronomy, furniture refinish, and repair, and lamping work.
These classes will be held at Kingswood School, Cranbrook School, the Cranbrook Academy of Art and the Cranbrook Institute of Science.
The Cranbrook Summer School of the Theatre will again center activities in the Greek Theatre on Louie Pine Road. This division of the Institute has enjoyed four successful seasons and enrollment at the present indicates another full capacity school.
