Then, and then only, will the United States regain its standard of living, its vaunted freedoms for all; the alternative to this is State Socialism, then totalitarianism, then civil war. Military Service
Necessary

The opponents of compulsory military service in this country assert that it will begin the development of militarism and that the United States will develop along the same line seen in Germany.

The advocates of such service in time of peace insist that no nation can retain its rights and freedom without heing able to defend itself and point to China as a land of vast resources, human and material, but hopelessly impotent in defense.

We have not heatisted to support the idea classes, despite some small risk of developing a militaristic complex; to voluntary, if possible, then compulsory, if necessary. The hope of something like permanent peace burns brightly but there is no assurance that this country will not become engaged in a future ware.

Neither is there reason to believe that, if a hird war begins, the United States will have time to mobilize, train and equip its fighting men while other, nations hold off the evil forces of a future day.

The situation seems to demand, in our opinion, that the United States must take the risks, insofar as they relate to the development of militarism. The good sense of our, people, together with their sincere love of peace, will save us from its evils.

Whether this is true, or not, the safety of the nation demands that it maintain adequate military forces to defend it against any possible attack.

We see THAT HENRY A. WALLACE, SECRETARY of Commerce, now wants the federal government to set up agencies in every community to "inform the small business man how to succeed in business." Henry is one of those ambitious dreamers who expects a poor example to result in good results; when yeas the federal government ever known, in those latter days, to be a business success itself?
