Restores Faith

"My pleasure was very great when I received your letter and learned that there are yet those who feel solidarity and are willing to give help to those who are very much in need. I have spent three years in a concentration camp, also twenty months hidden away from the Gestapo in a dirty place. At the time of my detention I was stripped of all I possessed. At the time of my liberation my weight which normally reached 140 lbs. was 80 lbs. and I was left to my own resources. When I recognized the fact that nobody came to my help, I became completely disheartened, losing faith in the meaning of the words 'humanitarianism', 'solidarity' and 'solidarity'. However, when I received your letter in which you offer help to us who suffer so much and continue to suffer, I am profoundly moved and I felt a rebirth of spiritual life, realizing that moral values have not died and that still the ideal of brotherhood, of usefulness and social justice exists unharmed.
