Garrison, Birmingham delegates to the National convention of the League of Women Voters, now being held at Kansas City, Mo., that last night's address by Maurice Stoddard Eccles, chairman of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, on "Our Economic Future," is the subject being considered by the delegates today.

League members at convention will decide today, after free discussion, whether to support a program working toward "Economic Policies which Promote Maximum Production and Employment," including the control of inflation and deflation, the study by government of the country's employment needs and possibilities, the federal encouragement of housing and a coordinated tax system.
