

### Oakland County Red Cross Nurse's Aide Work Ended

The Red Cross Nurses' Aide program in hospitals of Oakland County has been discontinued, according to Mrs. Ferd Brock, chairman of Volunteer Services of the Oakland County Chapter American Red Cross. Mrs. E. L. Bradley, chairman of the Nurses' Aide Corps, has directed the Corps since its beginning. In May, 1942, the first class went on duty in Oakland County hospitals and since that time 105,407 hours of volunteer time have been given by 553 Aides. The hospitals in which this Corps has served have been most cooperative and now state that it would have been impossible to have operated during the war emergency without them.

The fine performance of the Corps has resulted from the combined efforts of many individuals besides the Aides themselves. Those who have contributed time and efforts are Dr. E. B. Cudney and Ivan Björns, Pontiac, and Dr. John Lambie, Birmingham; Mrs. Lewis Daniels, staff member who instructed the Aides; the staff

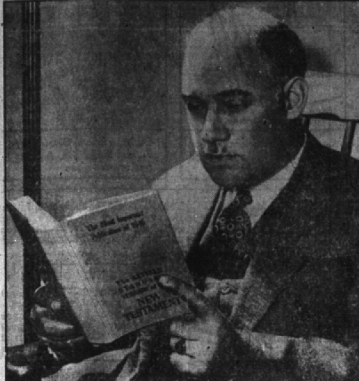
of each hospital who gave complete cooperation.

### Garden Council Picks Officers For Year At Meeting At Belle Isle

E. I. Besemer, Wayne county agricultural agent, was elected chairman of the Metropolitan Garden Council, in a meeting held last week at Belle Isle.

Other permanent officers chosen for 1946 are: Earl Bailey, secretary-manager of the Michigan Horticultural Society, who was named vice-chairman, and Dr. C. Louis Thiele, division director of sciences, Wayne University, who was elected secretary-treasurer.

The Council, organized a short time ago to help correlate the activities of Detroit area groups interested in garden activities, made plans for the public "Gardens for Food" rally which was held May 1 in Rackham Memorial Auditorium.

Because of the critical need for food to replace supplies being sent to famine areas abroad, the rally drew a large attendance.

Mayor Edward J. Jeffries, Jr., of Detroit, and mayors of 23 other cities in the metropolitan area were co-sponsors of the rally with Thiele, division director of the Council.

### Ordinance Number 325 CITY OF BIRMINGHAM

An Ordinance to Amend Ordinance Number 236, by Amending Section Five, and to Repeal Ordinance Number 299.

This Section Five, Sub-section (b) of Ordinance Number 236, is amended to read as follows:

The charges for sewer and water services as specified herein shall apply from March 1st to November 30th inclusive of each year and during the period of December 1st to March 15th inclusive of each year there shall be added to above prices an additional charge in the amount of \$15.00 a service in a street and \$15.00 for a service in an alley or easement.

The charges as listed above shall provide, where possible, a sewer with a depth of 4 feet below the grade at the property line. Where the applicant desires a sewer of greater depth and it is possible to provide same, an additional fee shall be paid to compensate the City for the additional cost of providing such additional depth.

The fees charged herein for water service and sewer service shall be full payment for the construction of the connection to the property line and in the case of water service shall include stop and stop box at said property line.

The Department may require the owner to provide the extension of the service to the building prior to the installation of the service by the Department.

The extension of these services from the property line to the building shall be in accordance with the specifications set forth herein and shall be installed by a licensed plumber, registered as such with the City and acting for the City and the fee for such permit shall be \$25.00 for water service, and \$25.00 for sewer service. Sewer services may be installed by a licensed drain layer.

The water and sewer service from the property line to the building shall be inspected and approved by the City Inspector prior to covering same.

This Ordinance No. 325 be and the same be hereby enacted.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately after the passage and upon publication thereof.

Made and passed by the Commission of the City of Birmingham, this 24th day of April, A.D., 1946.

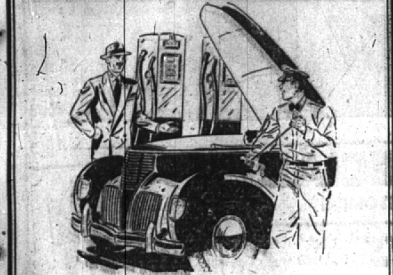
