Local Track Team Takes Second in State Regional Meet, Saturday, in Ypsilanti

Losing their crown to Ypsilanti at the State Regionals meet last Saturday in Ypsilanti after holding it for five consecutive years, Birmingham thinned a seventh-class qualified ten men for State Finals.

Fighting the disadvantages of a muddy track, Doc Watson took first place in the high hurdles and Jack Plister, also of the locals, finished far ahead of the pack in the 440 with the fastest time of the day. Other lapses going to East Lansing this Saturday are Bill Sproull who placed third in the pole vault; and Alan Joslyn, Don Buell, and Stan Smith, all of whom tied for third in the high jump.

John Broadhurst, miler, placed second, while Bud Gasser and Dana Elcar put the shot to second and third places. Charlie Renfrew took second in the broad jump, also qualifying.
The final tally was Ypsilanti, 58 1/2; Birmingham, 41; River Rouge, 33; Ecorse, 22 1/2; Cranbrook, 11; Hilldale, 8; Wayne, 6; Roseville, 6.

The only field record broken was in the broad jump. Thomas of Flint Central (class A) set the new record with 22 feet.
Tie at Ferndale
Second and fifth places in the broad jump, second from the last event, enabled Ferndale High to tie the Grosse Pointe for first place in the State Class A regional track meet at Ferndale. Each finished with 29 points. Grosse Pointe failed to place.
