ORCHARD LAKE PUBLIC FISHING SITE—RULES AND REGULATIONS
(Issued under authority of Act 17, Public Acts of 1911.)

IT SHALL BE UNLAWFUL:

- To occupy this site without having in possession an unexpired fishing license issued to the holder, children under 16 years of age must be accompanied by adults.
- To establish a camp on this site.
- To anchor or leave boats unattended overnight or to store or leave fish kettles on this site.
- To park cars or trailers on the site except at designated places, or to drive cars on the shore or on the beach, or to place any articles or equipment in cars or on the shore of the property.
- To build open fires on the site.
- To pollute, defile, or damage on the ground.
- To remove or injure trees, shrubs, plants or other vegetation, or to remove, or to injure any building, equipment, improvement, sign, or other public property.
- To place or distribute advertising signs or literature on the site.
- To occupy this site during the time that Orchard Lake is closed to all fishing.

These rules and regulations shall be in force and effect from June 20, 1946, to June 20, 1947.

PENALTY: Violation of any rule or failure to perform any act set forth in the rules is punishable by a fine of not more than \$100 and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 90 days, or by both fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.
