Big Beaver Methodist Church Starts Fund For Building



Last Sunday was Loyalty Day Sunday for Big Beaver Methodists when they inaugurated the first phase of their plan to raise forty thousand dollars by March 25, 1948. The service was held in the High School building at ten a. m.

Last October the church building, located at Rochester Road and Meadowcrest avenue, which had served the congregation from 1875 was destroyed by fire. Services and Sunday School, meanwhile have been held in the public school building.

The quarterly conference elected a building committee composed of present of Richard V. Welch, Walter Carpenter, Eric Franzen, W. Penney, Robert Domino, and Mrs. Ida Cornell, to engage an architect and secure plans for a new church edifice. Later the plans were submitted and adopted unanimously. The same meeting empowered the Building Fund Committee, comprising Forrest Clippert, Wesley Gibbons, Russell Robertson, Orville Spencer, Mrs. Helen Hill, Mrs. Hazel Jennings and Mrs. Gladys Miller, to raise \$40,000 over a two-year period, in addition to money on hand, \$15,000.00 from the fire insurance. An additional \$11,288.00 was received in cash and pledges last Sunday.

Accordingly the Building Fund Committee has made plans for organizing teams with captains to visit every home in the parish inviting members and friends to attend next Sunday's service and bring their cash gift or pledge.

Detroit Symphony To Play For Jubilee
