### How Far Do You Want Labor To Go In Its "Tasing" Powers?

Efforts on the part of James Hoffa, AFL Teamsters business agent in Detroit, to obtain six dollars from every grocer and meat purveyor in the Fourth City reveal how far certain segments of labor want to go in their quest for control.

These small merchants, using their own trucks, have been going to the homes of the grocers and meat purveyors, and at present, to pick up supplies.

Mr. Hoffa contends that by doing this he imposes upon the areas of his office, and he insists that they pay him six dollars per establishment, on an "associate member" basis.

Another phase of the situation is the AFL attempt to organize every employee of such small retail establishments, even though most of these employees may consist of members of the owners' own families.

Thus, folks, you see how far certain portions of the labor movement will go to frighten people into paying dues.

This is supposed to be the United States of America where men and women are supposed to be free.

It reveals, too, how far the New Deal government has drifted in its political trading for the votes of labor.

Does the American citizen have more personal economic freedom than he has today?

Shall we soon face the day when any person, seeking to own a business, with but three or four employees, must pay tribute to any labor leader who decides to descend upon him?

The Hoffa efforts in Detroit smack of plain extortion, in our opinion.

If he can get by with his designs, then Heaven help the whole population—for it will set a precedent for widespread "taxation" by any man who wishes to fatten his financial coffers; and such possibilities are almost limitless.

Labor has made tremendous gains in the past dozen years; but the curb on the over-zealous leaders, an aroused public will demand that labor be placed in a straight jacket, and pendulum will swing the other way, for labor has no divine right to become the tyrant of a democratic people.

When Lieut-Gov. Vernon J. Brown attacked Kim Siger, one of the opponents of the Republican nomination for Governor last week, the 73-year-old gentleman opened his eyes for quite a rebuttal.
