

### Schools Will Give Security Council Program on May 15

Baldwin High School will present an all-student United Nations program for the community, which is cordially invited to attend, next Wednesday evening, May 15, at 8 o'clock in Baldwin Auditorium when a panorama of the peacekeeping Security Council, favored with the freshness of youth's point of view as world citizens, will unfold in model form. Students hope for a large audience at this pro-

gram for which there is no charge. The public evening presentation of the model Security Council will be a study devoted to the subject in the school, during which the program will be presented in the afternoon. Much preparation and effort has gone into this project which the students feel Birmingham will view with interest as youth's search for a peaceful path in a war weary world.

Highlighted will be the arguments and discussion amongst the eleven student members of the model Security Council: Dick Husted, for the U. S. A.; Bill Egan, for Great Britain; Knight Houghton, for China, the presiding officer; Austin Jones, for Russia; Dick Robertson, for France; Ronald Keiser, for Mexico; Howard Love, for Brazil; Spencer De Vant, for the Netherlands; Don Davies, for Poland; Don Coulter, for Egypt; John Brodum, for Australia.

Immigration into Palestine, a "hot" issue in the current news, will be the topic of discussion. The question will be brought before the Council by Bill Egan, president of the senior class, presenting the report of the Anglo-American Palestine Commission, appointed to study the problem.

In accordance with the objectives of the Congress, all music played by the clinic band this year was by American composers. In most cases the composers were in Detroit to conduct their own compositions.

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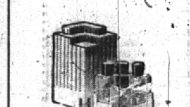

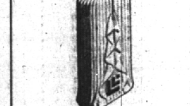
