GET PICTURES IN EARLY To help those who may have reason to submit photographs to the Birmingham Eccentric for reproduction in the newspaper, we offer the following suggestions:

Black and white pictures are preferred. Color or tinted pictures cannot be used. Pictures with light backgrounds suit easier to reproduce than those with a black background and the picture should be clear and the lines distinct. A glossy photograph makes a clearer cut than one with a dull finish.

Pictures should be submitted one week before the issue of the paper in which they are to be used. Friday noon is the deadline. Timeliness is important in news priority and a picture is more likely to be used if it is provided at the correct time.
