The fact that beauty may come in small coat was evidenced in the talk by Mrs. A. F. Allmayer of Detroit, who spoke Monday afternoon to the members of the Birmingham branch of the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association. The event took place in the Community House.

In her talk, "The Homeowner's Approach to Flower Arrangements," Mrs. Allmayer stressed the use of materials at hand and demonstrated attractive arrangements fashioned from seed pods, dried grasses, leaves, dried flowers, along with evergreens, vines and flowers, watching that the container was in keeping both as to line and color. Philosophy for homemakers was woven into her talk.

Ergasterion to Stage Comedy-Fantasy Next Month at Cranbrook

Harry Segall's comedy fantasy "Here Comes Mr. Jordan" will be Ergasterion's eighteenth annual Christmas offering on the Cranbrook stage Dec. 6 and 7, according to the director, Carl G. Wonnberger.

Wonnberger has directed all seventeen plays produced previously, and has named for this year's production, "Here Comes Mr. Jordan," a comedy by Noel Coward, Cranbrook faculty member, as his associate.

"Here Comes Mr. Jordan" will have separate casts for each night of performances, and will include players from Cranbrook and Kingswood, many of whom are active in the Cranbrook Summer School Theater.

The Segall comedy is a story about a disembodied spirit who has been carried off to heaven before his time by an over-zealous celestial manager. He is placed, inappropriately in the body of a shady financier and then in the body of a murdered prize-fighter, before he achieves the happiness he deserves and the love of the girl of his choice.

Settings for the play are being devised under the direction of Robert Lohman of the Cranbrook Art Academy and the Art department of Cranbrook School. Execution of the set is under the supervision of Robert McDaniell, Cranbrook senior and stage manager of Ergasterion.

Bert Robb of Birmingham, Ergasterion's secretary, is in charge of tickets and public relations, while Gilbert Ornes of Detroit is handling the poster campaign. James Wysonog, the Ergasterion president, is chairman of the student play committee.
