Miss Brainerd is secretary-general of the International Congress of Women which will meet in Guatemala next April, and is also chairman of the committee of the Americas Women's League, and editor of "Noticias," the quarterly

bulletin in Spanish sent to organizations in all parts of the Americas.

Her most distinctive position was that of chief of the division of intellectual cooperation of the Pan-American Union, for 35 years. She has constantly sought to awaken American conscience against all forms of imperialism and to make the Good Neighbor policy a reality.

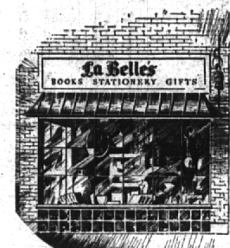
