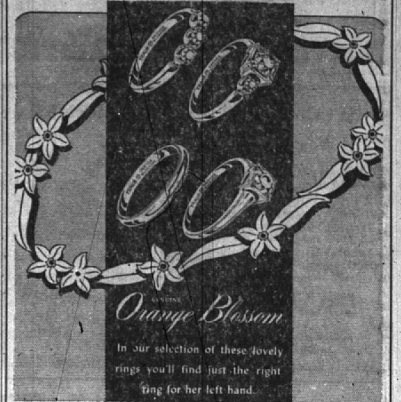
Cooperative Group And Guests Square Dance in Farm Scene
