## Dr. Ireland Talks To Rotary Anns

Dr. Dwight B. Ireland, superintendent of schools, was guest speaker for the Rotary Anns meeting held last Monday in the home of Mrs. Ernest H. Fletcher of Tottenham road.

Dr. Ireland's subject was "Education Does Face a Crisis," and according to him, "articles are appearing in all leading periodicals describing the plight of the public school teacher and frequently failing to point out the fact that it is not the obligation of the teacher in terms of salary and security that is the important thing."

"It is the type of educational experience which comes to the child in a classroom situation which is set up by a teacher who is not adequately prepared to lead that child through a variety of experiences which will enable him to grow and mature so that he will be able to take his place in the world upon graduation from school with a reasonable chance to succeed."

"Grave Responsibility"  
Dr. Ireland continued, "With a world so challenging, so divided, so desperately in need of leadership, the responsibility of the public school becomes grave. The classroom should attract the best minds of the country; instead, the profession of education receives least consideration on the part of a boy or girl seeking a profession."

He went on to say, "Such a vicious circle can only be broken by improving the status of the position of teacher through a program of acquainting young men and women with the challenges of the classroom and the assurance of sufficient remuneration to permit them to gain experience as a classroom teacher to the extent that they can more nearly interpret the world to the child."
