citizens and to the medical profession in that area.

The new South Oakland County Hospital Authority will amply take care of the health problems in that region. A general hospital there should receive much merited support.

Community Contribution

"Stretching from Rochester and Pontiac westward to the Bloomfield Hills and Birmingham territories, hospital facilities are totally lacking. The suburban populations in the towns and the rural communities in this contiguous region could be well served if a health center comprised of a diagnostic clinic, hospital and research laboratories were erected in a convenient location. The Bloomfield Medical Center, therefore planned as a community contribution of this type in the form of a non-profit institution equipped with every facility for preventive and curative medicine."

The report stated that it is planned to begin promptly the solicitation of additional contributions.

While actual building cannot commence until adequate and proper materials and labor are available, it is proposed that the building program be promptly initiated to a point where no delay will be suffered when it is practical to proceed.

World Aids All Patients

The proposed 175-bed hospital would consist of private rooms, semi-private and ward beds, the executive offices, pharmacy, diet kitchen, cafe, laundry and supply rooms are to be part of the main structure, according to the report. Separate quarters for internists, neurologists and non-professional personnel would be separate buildings.

The hospital and the ambulatory out-patient department would admit patients of all races and creeds, independent of their ability to pay. Those on an income level unable to meet the cost of medical care would be examined and treated with the same diligence and understanding as those fully able to pay for services.

"When income is insufficient to both ambulatory and hospitalized reaches capacity, an institution of this type should be self-sustaining. From the start, provisions should be made for an endowment fund, it is therefore felt that the Bloomfield Medical Center project should be considered to be a \$2,000,000 to \$2,500,000 project."

Coulson Property Is Rezoned To Permit Terraces

Originally opposed by several abutting property owners, as well as other home owners in the immediate vicinity, the City Commission Monday evening approved the petition of Frank Coulson for the rezoning of a large parcel of property on the west side of Woodward, several hundred feet south of Redding road, from multiple dwelling and single residence to terrace classification.

Several Lakeside and Redding road residents early in the meeting protested the rezoning on the basis that it would be a detriment to their single residence properties.

When the discussion resulted in a suggestion that the petitioner and the opposing property owners get together on some agreement, the matter was tabled by the commission and the opposing parties adjourned to another room in the municipal building to work out a proposal.

Before the commission meeting adjourned, the opposing factions returned with an agreement which was acceptable to both parties.

Coulson agreed to have his deed to the property restricted and recorded so that nothing but a colonial type terrace could be erected on his property.

Seeing that both parties agreed on the rezoning and that previous written objections were orally withdrawn, the commission moved to take the rezoning from the table; then decided favorably on the change in zoning.

"This is the first time to my knowledge since I have been on the city commission that two opposing parties have got together and come forth with a proposal that is agreeable to both sides," Commissioner John E. Martin remarked.

Dr. W. Lloyd Kemp, Birmingham physician, has been chosen to conduct the Orpheus Club of Detroit in its two annual private concerts at Music Hall, Detroit, 1946, and April 16, 1947. Dr. Kemp succeeds Charles Frederic Morse who has retired after 35 years of continuous leadership.

Dr. Kemp, despite the demands of his profession, has always retained music as his avocation. He attended the University School of Music and has had a varied experience musically. He was organist and choirmaster of St. Mark's Methodist Church in Detroit and for four years was organist and choirmaster at Christ Church Cranbrook.

Assuming the conductorship of the Orpheus Club is in the nature of a home-coming for Dr. Kemp as he was formerly a singing member of the Club and was president during two seasons.

Canadian Guest Artist

The Orpheus Club of Detroit, one of America's outstanding musical organizations, was founded in 1900 by twelve business and professional men, singing enthusiasts. Today the 46-voice ensemble includes many outstanding vocalists of the metropolitan area.

Two annual concerts are presented before an associate membership composed of those interested in the finest in male choral music and others "who just like to hear men sing." These concerts have long been a part of the community's musical tradition.

Soloist will appear as guest soloist with the Club at the December concert, Miss Law will sing with the Club in "Midnight" by Johannes Brahms. In addition to appearing in other choral numbers, Miss Law will present a group of arias and lieder.
