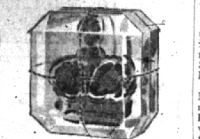

Red Cross To Send Boxes To Percy Jones

At a luncheon meeting held Monday at "Kennaway," the home of Romaine Thompson, the committee on community service to camps and hospitals, Oakland County chapter of the Red Cross, worked toward the packaging of Christmas boxes to be sent to veteran patients at Percy Jones Hospital in Battle Creek. The quota has been set at 1500 boxes, and 500 Christmas stockings will also be sent.

Hospital officials at Percy Jones have written Mrs. Appel stating that many of the veterans are still bed-ridden and have many months of hospitalization before returning to civilian life, and that anything that can be done to enliven the atmosphere during the holiday season will be greatly appreciated.

Packages for the men and women may be taken by interested persons to the Community House, on or before Dec. 15.

The gifts should be attractively wrapped with removable labels specifying whether the gift is for a man or woman and the contents. The sender's name may also be included on the tag. The Red Cross has set the value per package at three or four dollars.

Gifts may include pen and pencil sets, cigarette lighters, billfolds, cigar cases, writing kits, shoe shining equipment, shaving sets, T-shirts, scarves, ties, tobacco, pipes, poker chips, bed lamps and socks.

Gifts that should not be included for men are crossword or jigsaw puzzles, scrapbooks, liquor, perishable or second-hand articles.

The Red Cross points out that combination radio-record players and records should not be sent to an individual but as a gift to a hospital ward etc., where it will be used to the greatest advantage by the most men.
