Students For Sigler In Mock Election

In a mock election held election day, even the students at Baldwin High School cast a landslide vote for Kim Sigler. He drew 234 votes against Van Wagener's 94.

Mrs. Anne C. Laeth and J. Jay Myers, social studies teachers at Baldwin, devised a plan by which students registered Friday and Monday and voted election day. While 407 students registered, approximately 60 ballots were disqualified.

Eugene C. Keyes was selected by them as Lieutenant Governor with 237 votes; Arthur H. Vandenberg for state senate with 208 votes, and George A. Dondero as State representative with 234 votes.

No vote was taken on the state or city amendments.
