She will sing two groups of songs, accompanied by Robert Bates, director of music at Cranbrook School.

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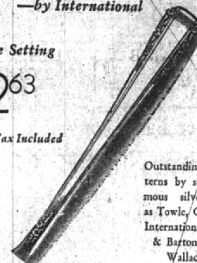
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SOCIAL NEWS IN BRIEF
