A lively discussion took place last Wednesday evening in the school auditorium when Earl Bedell, division director of the Tech and Trade schools of Detroit and a member of the Board of Livonia Township, spoke on the consolidated school system which has long been a matter of debate in Southfield Township.

Mr. Bedell pointed out the advantages of the plan which Livonia has adopted since taking an almost unanimous vote on the question. He urged Southfield Township to adopt it for the good of the students and the community in general.

Bedell asked Mrs. Kelley (Louise Lathrup) what the township would do in the event that Royal Oak turned down additional high school students as did Redford and Farm-

ington high schools in the Livonia Township case. Mrs. Kelley replied that the Royal Oak schools, has assured her that it will not happen for various reasons, one being that Royal Oak has been able to hire additional teachers due to the tuition paid for farm-out students from this vicinity. Mr. Kelley stressed the fact that he is not concerned over the problem of consolidation, because Lathrup students are receiving a fine education with no anxiety over the future.

Following Bedell's talk, Dr. Ray Smittle, department head of Wayne University, answered questions on consolidated school systems.

Lathrup Township Women's club met Monday afternoon and it was announced that the club will take on the project of starting a fund with which to establish a permanent Community House. Ways and Means committee will offer a series of events towards the project during the coming year.

He devoted this tremendously inspirational work to the memory of his best friend, the poet Manzoni. ### Hills Photographers Will Meet Tonight

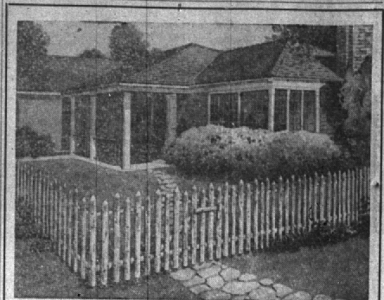

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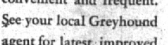
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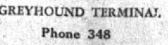
