The Old Traveler Recommends A Meal Along State's Color-Lined Highways

Well, Fall is here, the ideal season for roadside breakfasts on Sundays and noontime lunches as we roam the color-lined highways. Park grills beg for the amateur cook to do his stuff, and along the margin of a blue lake you can always find enough stones to build yourself a "stove" for whipping out a quick meal.

Somewhat food always tastes better in the outdoors, and you have only to prow! Michigan's highways and check the picnicking to be grilled over an open fire.

Likes Southern Method
As for bacon or ham and eggs I lean to the old Southern method of cooking my bacon or ham to the desired degree, draining off most of the drippings and then breaking my eggs right on top of the meat. If you want something super-super, cut into the ham or bacon just a wee bit of onion, that before the eggs are added.

And, of course, certain foods can be prepared at home the night before to be heated at luncheon time on the park stove. I particularly have in mind one dish I've been eating over many years. Some weeks ago I had it once again in its native haath, for I was eating with the Gloucester fishermen on a fishing boat plying out of that picturesque port.

Simply Prepared
The fishermen call it "fish chowder," but, as a matter of fact, it's fish stew until, if you so elect, you add milk to it. The stew—or "chowder" if you prefer—is simple in preparation and you'll find it an ideal dish for home serving as well as for taking out on the picnic to be heated. And here's the way you make it:

In an iron pot, or Dutch oven, fry out bacon or salt pork cut into small pieces. Fry until the meat are done brown and crisp bits. Cut fillets of cod or haddock into one-inch cubes, salt and pepper and roll in flour, and brown in the drippings and crisp bacon.

When the fish is brown, cut in a couple of tomatoes, an onion or so and two or three potatoes. Add water to cover and let simmer slowly until potatoes are cooked. Add additional salt and pepper, and if desired, cut into and add a small amount of celery.

A Few Additions
Now—
The chowder is right for serving as is, but one of two additional things may be done, and I think either one of these things will provide you with an unforgettable dish.

No. 1—Mix a small amount of flour and cold water and add slowly to the chowder for thickening, and add hot water to bring on the consistency you desire.

No. 2—Into the chowder as originally cooked pour whole milk to form the consistency you desire. In this treatment, of course, add additional seasoning.

In either of the three shapes the chowder is improved by breaking into it sea biscuit or any hard cracker.

In the above proportions are for the use of about one pound of fish fillets and, with the addition of water or milk, should liberally serve about four persons. With this chowder there is no real need for other than strong black coffee.
