Lutheran Church Opens Branch Sunday School
 On Sunday morning, Oct. 10, Redwood Lutheran Church will open a branch Sunday school in the Walnut Lake subdivision, according to the Rev. Theodor Wugazer, pastor of the church.
 "This move is a result of a canvass conducted of that territory during the latter part of August," said Mr. Wugazer. "It was found that the church was working directly in that area and a number of children were not receiving the benefit of a formal religious training."
 "This fact was brought to the attention of the school board at Walnut Lake, and they granted the request for the use of the public school on Sunday mornings," he said.
 The Sunday school will be conducted every Sunday morning from 9:15 to 10:15. Redwood

church will supply the teaching staff and will also subsidize the new Sunday School by purchasing the lesson materials and by paying the rent for the use of the school room.
 Members of the congregation who will serve as teachers are Mr. and Mrs. Martin Otto, Mrs. W. D. Brawner, and Jeanne Dahlquist. "Other territories surrounding Birmingham have been canvassed by myself and by members of the congregation within the last year," said Mr. Wugazer. "It is planned ultimately to begin additional Sunday Schools wherever practical."

Oakland County RED CROSS NEWS
 Mrs. L. L. Northrup of Birmingham, nutrition chairman of the Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, announces that Miss Jeanette Goldhorpe, nutrition field representative from the Midwest Area office at St. Louis will spend three days next week, conferring with chapter and public health officials regarding nutrition needs in Oakland County.
 The American Red Cross, through its local chapters, extends nutrition service to local communities. Because of the importance of diet to health and well being, the American Red Cross has developed a program in nutrition education to present some of the ill health caused by malnutrition. Every survey of diets in the past ten years has shown that the diets of individuals in the United States do not contain enough of the essential elements.
 Many diets are inadequate in amounts, but many more are inadequate in specific food nutrients essential to good health. During Miss Goldhorpe's visit a special meeting will be held with Dr. B. G. Tuck, director of Royal Oak district, Oakland County Health Department, and representatives of the Visiting Nurse Association, to discuss special nutrition needs in Southern Oakland County.

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REGISTRATION NOTICE FOR GENERAL ELECTION
Tuesday, November 5, 1946
 To the Qualified Electors of the City of Birmingham, State of Michigan, County of Oakland.
 To vote at this election all persons must be registered in the City by Wednesday, October 16, 1946, at 8 P. M. Eastern Standard Time.
 Citizens of the United States, 21 years old, who have resided in the State of Michigan six months and in the City of Birmingham twenty days at the time of voting are eligible.
 TO REGISTER, call at the City Clerk's office in the Municipal Building on or before Wednesday, October 16th, 1946 during business hours. The City Clerk's office will be open on Tuesday, October 15th, and on Wednesday, October 16th from 8 A. M. until 8 P. M. Eastern Standard Time.
 NOTE TO MILITARY PERSONNEL WHO VOTED BY ABSENTEE BALLOT WHILE IN SERVICE: Michigan Statutes provided for the voting of NON-REGISTERED electors who were in the armed forces of the United States, the Merchant Marine, nurses or Civilians on War Duty, if at least 21 years of age and otherwise qualified. All persons who cast an absentee ballot under such provisions, and who have returned to civilian duties must now register in order to vote.
 Any registered elector who has moved from one address in Birmingham to another address in Birmingham, since he last voted, may cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for transfer at any time before Wednesday, October 16th, any person who has not voted within a two year period, and who has not re-instated his registration, must re-register by October 16th.

When the fiscal year began, the General Fund had a surplus of \$5,219,753.68. This amount, added to the \$16,318,602.33 operating surplus for the year, made a total of \$21,538,356.01 as of July 30, 1946. This amount is available for appropriation. THERE WAS NO OTHER UNRESTRICTED SURPLUS.
 There were, however, funds restricted by the legislature for definite purposes, such as—the \$50,000,000 in the Veterans' Trust Fund, the \$11,453,489.05 in the State Highway Fund, the \$27,981,096.15 in appropriation balances for uncompleted building and improvement, the \$16,417,250.03 in the Primary School Fund, etc. THESE BALANCES WERE NOT AVAILABLE FOR GENERAL PURPOSES.
