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tative for the third district of Oakland County will present his proposals No. 1 and No. 3, according to Hammond.

Proposal No. 1 limits state control and participation in certain internal improvements. An earlier amendment, in 1945, failed to provide for state assistance in establishing airways and waterways. The 1945 legislature set aside money for this purpose (still held in escrow) but a ruling by the Attorney General stopped expenditure. This omission was brought to the attention of the 1946 Session, and a joint resolution brought forth Proposal No. 1.

Discuss Charter Amendments. Proposal No. 3 provides a payment of a bonus to each person, or immediate survivors, who served in the last war and had six months prior to entering service. Estimated cost of the bonus would be \$270,000,000, paid to some 630,000 persons with an average payment of \$32.40. The proposal specifies no method of raising the money excepting that the cost of payment is greater than the amount authorized to be borrowed. The Legislature is directed to provide it from the State's general fund.

A brief discussion of the two proposed amendments to the Birmingham City Charter, which would enable the city to acquire and operate parking facilities, and to require earlier filing of candidates' petitions, will be presented by City Attorney Forbes S. Haskell, Hammond stated. Clark Coulter, Birmingham attorney, will preside at the "Town Meeting." Dr. Dwight B. Ireland, superintendent of schools, will also be on hand to answer questions on Proposal No. 2 concerning school funds. Mrs. T. Hollister Mabley will be timekeeper.
