French Children Want American Correspondents

Last year through the generosity of many Birmingham women the ways and means committee of the local unit of the Save the Children Federation was able to sponsor three schools in devastated France.

Due to transportation and communication difficulties which are now clearing up, the grateful responses of children in these schools have only recently been received in the form of individual letters from each child, many enclosing their picture and nearly all expressing the desire to have some American child correspond with him personally.

In addition to the separate letters, there is one signed by all the children in the school at Frauenberg, France, located on the Franco-German border. This letter told of the difficulties experienced by the people of the town itself, and ended with the again expressed wish for American pen-pals.

It is the hope of the members of the ways and means committee, of which Mrs. C. D. Hartsuff is chairman, that many adults as well as children will wish to write, or perhaps send a package of food, clothing, needy items, or a monetary donation to defray the costs of sending the boxes, especially for Christmas.
