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The first nine months of 1946 were the busiest months Michigan Bell has ever known. Despite shortages of many critical materials like copper, steel and lead—shortages which affected our supply of telephone equipment—we put in more telephones than during any previous nine-month period. . . as many, in fact, as during any previous entire year. But even that record-breaking performance was not enough.

We have been able to take care of a large majority of the customers who had placed their orders for telephones with us prior to January 1, 1946. And we hope to complete orders for the rest of those applicants by early next year. . . in many cases sooner than that.

Of course, in areas where facilities were available, we have been able to fill many orders that have come in this year. Most of those installations have been for new applicants entitled, under government priorities, to get service ahead of older applicants with lower priorities.

By and large, however, new low-priority applications have piled up almost as fast as we have been able to clean up the old ones. But we have made progress in meeting the sky-rocketing demand for telephones.

TELEPHONE USE UP

The first nine months of 1946 also brought an extraordinary increase in the use of the telephone. Local calls in Michigan now are running at the rate of 7,397,000 in a normal business day. . . an increase of 1,393,000 a day over last year. Long distance calls are at an all-time high, averaging nearly 160,000 a day compared with 143,000 in 1945. As a result of the record-breaking load on the equipment, service is not always as good as we want it to be. But despite that, more people are getting more good telephone service now than ever before.

THERE'S STILL A BIG JOB AHEAD

Nearly 80,000 applicants in our territory still are waiting for telephones. No effort is being spared to bring service to them, and to improve the quality of service for everybody, just as fast as we can. In the face of continuing material shortages, we shall do our best to get all the additional equipment we need to provide more and better telephone service as quickly as possible. Michigan Bell's huge \$150,000,000 expansion and improvement program is dedicated to that end.

In talking with Dr. Dwight B. Ireland, superintendent of schools, the Wanderer learns that if amendment No. 5 to the State constitution is passed Nov. 5, the Birmingham School district will stand to gain \$77,000. He based the figure on the Michigan Educational Association formula. In addition to the nine-tenths of the sales tax, schools would continue to receive state school aid and money from the primary school interest fund.

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
