The main room of the Community House blazed forth in a riot of natural colors last week when the annual fruit, flower and vegetable show was judged there last Saturday and Sunday.

The show was presented under the auspices of the Bloomfield Hills and District Horticultural Society. Walter Killing, 387 George street, acted as chairman.

By far the most colorful of the displays were the four huge tables of flowers, each contributed by one person.

Blue ribbon on the table collections went to G. G. Booth, A. G. Muat, gardener. In twelve square feet of space, the exhibitor displayed a vase of almost every known variety of garden flower, Delphiniums were combined with huge, butterfly bush; pale pink spider plant with sprays of lupine, delphinium were again combined with red-gold marigolds.

Blue periwinkles were arranged with dusty miller, Mexican zinnias were highlighted by themselves; and there were ruffled pe-


