composed of public school pupils.

May Lose Credits
"If a test case is made and such society at a later date is declared by the courts to be illegal, the student will lose the credits earned through the semesters during which he was a member of that society."

"Future rulings of the State's attorney-general or the courts will be respected even though they reverse present rulings or opinions."

In his opinion, Ireland told the assembly, "The risk involved in belonging to these societies is greater than the values received from such memberships."

He urged students to withdraw from these societies so as not to endanger their credits, promotion or graduation from Baldwin Senior High School.

Extracted With Law
"We are respectful of the law, and we expect to carry out the law insofar as we may be entrusted to do so," Ireland said in concluding his remarks to the students.

The superintendent said Tuesday that the attitude of a number of persons who had subsequently contacted him by phone or in person, could be summed up in the statement of one parent who declared, "I know my youngster is a member of a high school organization, but I don't want him to be when the risks as you have just outlined them are so great."

Ireland said that he was not going to permit him to take chances when at some future date he may find his organization declared illegal should a test case develop.

Ireland said that he knew of only one fraternity which has openly come forward and dissolved itself.

MSCP Dissolves
In a letter to Ireland, William E. Kindley, 2540 Dorchester, stated, "As president and an official agent of Club MSCP, I do hereby declare that as of Sept. 9, 1946, all active members of Club MSCP enrolled in Baldwin High School have resigned and thereby dissolved all affiliation with Club MSCP."

THEO, an organization of high school girls, has told Ireland and Ross Wagner, principal of Baldwin, that they definitely want to open their membership to any other high school girl who wishes to join.

"THEO seems to me to be the most democratic of all the girls' organizations, even prior to the recent discussions of these secret organizations," Ireland said.

He pointed out that the Junior Musical, composed of high school boys and girls with musical ability, another of the more democratic societies.

"They can very easily become an all-school organization, and have indicated a desire to do so. There has been some doubt in the past as to exactly what their standing is in relation to the law," Ireland explained.

Check Of Furnaces Shows 75% Need Many Repairs

Fire Marshal George S. Scott is again warning Birmingham residents to check all phases of their heating plant in order to prevent costly fires caused by failure to replace worn out furnace pipes and fittings.

A month ago Scott reminded Birmingham people that an inspector from the fire department would check their heating equipment if a request was made.

"Seventy-five per cent of all the furnaces checked as a result of these requests were in bad condition and needed repair before being used," Scott recalled.

"We were flooded with calls for a few days, and someone went out on each call. Mostly we found old, worn-out pipes, badly in need of replacement."

Many Need Repairs
"Now that the weather is beginning to turn colder, more people are using their furnaces. We know from previous experience that many of those furnaces will be in no condition to be used this winter without the attendant risk of a dangerous fire."

Scott reiterated the importance of having safe furnace conduits.

"During the spring and summer," he stated, "most of our fires are gas fires, usually caused by no great loss in property. But in the winter most fires are caused by a faulty heating system, and can be very costly indeed. Your safeguard is to call the fire prevention bureau at 1725, and have your furnace checked."

While Scott has heard that pipe and other furnace repair materials are difficult to obtain, he reminds each resident that they are far easier to obtain than a new house.

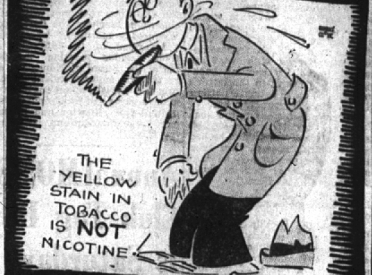

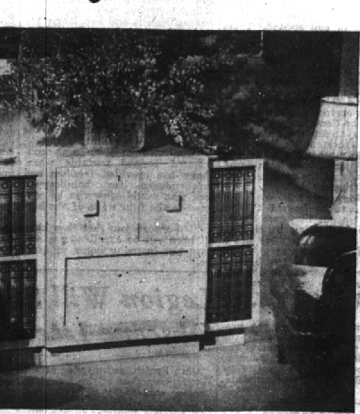
