Soon after their departure Mr. Herrick complained of chest pain and he and Black went for a stroll. Upon their return, Black became alarmed over the condition of his friend and called a physician residing in the apartment. Herrick died ten minutes after being stricken.

Mr. and Mrs. Herrick have resided in the townsite more than five years.

Surviving besides his wife, Kathleen, are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. Herrick, a brother, Reid, and a sister, Elizabeth, all of Conneaut, Ohio.

Funeral services were held at Harper-Mulligan funeral home at three o'clock Tuesday afternoon, under the auspices of Detroit Commandery No. 1. He was also a member of Redford chapter No. 178, B.A.M., and Evergreen Lodge 222, F. & A.M., of Conneaut, Ohio. Interment was at Accia Park cemetery.
