Violators of "No Hunting" law in Southfield township will be brought to grief as the new constable is appointed, according to C. F. Stevens, director of Southfield Township Board. Complaints are pouring in to township hall of hunters roaming through the township and taking pot shots which endanger life and limb. The Township board approved a salary of \$200 for the coming season and the new constable will be named in a few days.

The question of roaming dogs again confronted the Board of Commissioners at last week's meeting. A complainant stated that his child was recently bitten on the hand. He claimed that mongrels roam the streets at will and without license. The Board reiterated the fact that it is powerless to act on the dog problem and that the dog warden is appointed by the county board of supervisors and that he works on percentage basis. 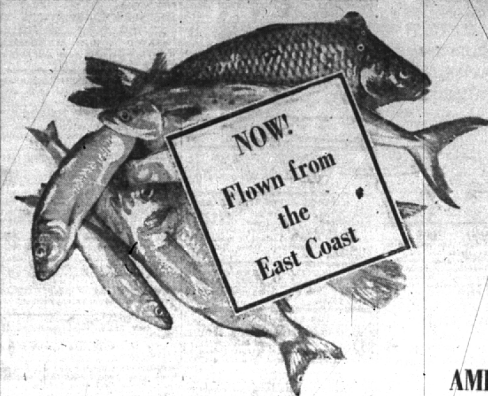
