## SUNDAY DINNER Suggestions

FRESH sweet corn, now making an appearance in the markets, gives housewives another excellent vegetable to add to menus for the remainder of the summer. It is a particular favorite of picnicers who like to eat as many meals as possible out of doors.

Sweet corn is tasty and succulent when correctly handled. It is important for cooks to remember, however, that fresh corn deteriorates rapidly after being harvested, according to the A & P Service for Home-makers. Consequently, it is wise to allow a minimum of time to elapse between picking and eating.

Both the yellow and white varieties are good sources of B<sub>1</sub>, the energy vitamin, and of C and G. Yellow sweet corn is also an excellent source of Vitamin A.

By far the most popular way to serve corn is "on the cob." Drop ears into boiling water after husking, cover and boil five to ten minutes, depending upon the freshness of the corn. Serve piping hot, to be salted and peppered individually at the table. To serve steamed, cut kernels from the cob and place in a double boiler, adding butter and milk or cream. Cover and cook over hot water 10 to 15 minutes, then season to taste.

Others like corn made into succotash, a recipe originated by the American Indians. Split separately two parts of fresh or canned corn kernels and one part of young lima or green beans. Combine vegetables, bean pot liquor and milk or cream. Then reheat and season. Once cooked, succotash can also be served for use in pancake batter to prepare corn fritters.

To create an appetizing Sunday dinner, try a menu composed of chopped stein, sweet corn on the cob, stewed tomatoes, fresh fruit salad, baked custard and a beverage.
