

Golf Pros Teach Game Backwards, Speaker Asserts

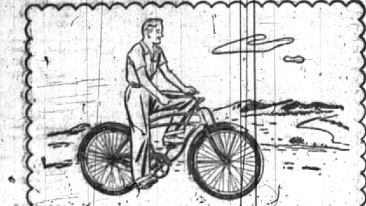
At a luncheon of the Michigan section of the Professional Golfers' Association held at the Detroit-Leland Hotel last week, General A. Flores, 237 S. Field, president of Flores, Inc., Detroit, spoke before an enthusiastic audience on the subject: "The Golf Pro—Through the Eyes of the Duffer."

Flores pointed out that too often the professional golf instructor has gained his position solely on his ability to play the game, without regard for his ability to teach it. As a result, is most

cases the game has been taught backward, starting with the long range wood clubs which are the hardest to use and progressing downward to the putter. Too often because the beginner invariably muffs these long shots, he builds up a psychological barrier which he may never overcome.

"It is more logical," Flores stated, "to teach golf by starting out with the putter, gradually building up the swing from the short putting stroke through chipping and pitching and eventually working up to the use of the longer irons and wood clubs."

"Such a system of teaching," he asserted, "would enable the pupil not only to develop a swing suitable to his own physical structure, but also to gain greater self-confidence through a sounder grasp of the fundamentals."

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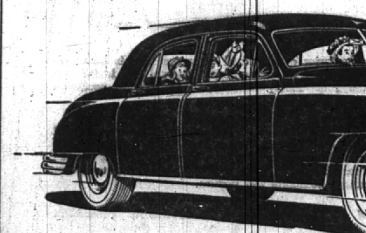

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Local Scout Troop Praised for Part in Recent Show

The B-4 contribution was the building of a "monkey bridge," a type of primitive bridge built in early days to enable people to cross streams, chasms or similar obstructions. The material used was rope or strong vines extending between wooden terminals.

The complete bridge was built before the audience, only prefabricated parts being two abutments representing the banks of a stream upon which the bridge proper was built.

Takes Only 8 Minutes

During the construction, the two terminals were lashed and positioned and a foot walk was constructed by flat braiding six lengths of rope, hand rails put in place, and the whole structure fastened down securely to allow boys to pass.

Time for completing the construction the first night was eight minutes, reduced to six minutes the second night.
