CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, MICHIGAN RUBBISH DISPOSAL ORDINANCE

An Ordinance to Regulate the Handling and Disposal of Rubbish in the City of Birmingham, the Adoption of Rules and Regulations Relative Thereto, to Provide for the Collection and Disposal Thereof, and to Provide Penalties for Violations Hereof.

The City of Birmingham Ordinance: This shall include any individual, firm, partnership or corporation. Rubbish shall include animal and vegetable refuse, household refuse, garbage, refuse, cooking and other waste, and all other refuse, subject to rapid decomposition. (Garbage as defined herein does not include waste from food processing plants, large quantities of condensed food products, food animals or manure.)

Rubbish (Comestibles) includes: paper, cartons, boxes, barrels, and ordinary combustible waste from residences and businesses establishments.

Rubbish (Non-Comestible) includes: metal, tin cans, bottles, glass, crockery, and other mineral refuse.

Street refuse includes: from trees, lawns, shrubs, or buildings; dirt and contents of litter receptacles.

Dead Animals include: carcasses of animals, fowls or fish. The term "dead animals" as used herein does not include carcasses from veterinary hospitals.

Construction Debris includes: waste materials resulting from alteration, repair or construction of buildings or structures.

Yard Waste consists of: tree branches, twigs, grass, shrub clippings, weeds, leaves, general yard and garden waste materials.

Plastic Waste includes: plastic materials from factories and processing plants; machine and animal parts from veterinary hospitals. (The care, collection and disposal of this type of material is the responsibility of the tenant of the premises.)

Where, in this ordinance, the word "refuse" is used, it shall include all of the foregoing items of waste as defined in this section.

Section 2. A. The Director of Public Works shall collect and remove all ordinary refuse, garbage and industrial waste, when ordered by such collector or authorized Officer of Birmingham. He shall prepare and file with the City Clerk a list of collectors for each year of collecting for such refuse. He shall also file with the City Clerk a list of such collectors and such other regulations, conditions and rules as may be deemed advisable for the collection and removal of such refuse.

B. No person, firm or corporation, engaged in the business of collecting and removing refuse, shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this Ordinance shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$100.00 and to the cost of collection and removal of such refuse, and to the cost of any and all other expenses incurred by the City in connection with such violation. Any person, firm or corporation who is convicted of a violation of this Ordinance shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$100.00 and to the cost of collection and removal of such refuse, and to the cost of any and all other expenses incurred by the City in connection with such violation.

C. The material to be removed from residential streets, yards, porches, walks, sidewalks, and other places where such material is prohibited, shall include but not be limited to: household refuse, food waste, animal waste, yard waste, and garbage.

D. Any building, or industrial establishment, engaged in any manufacturing, processing, or other business, shall be required to maintain within the premises of the building, a receptacle for refuse, which shall be located in such a position as to be readily accessible by the Director of Public Works. The receptacle shall be kept filled with refuse, and shall be removed by the Director of Public Works, at such intervals as may be required. Any building or industrial establishment which fails to maintain such a receptacle for refuse, or which fails to keep such a receptacle filled with refuse, shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$100.00 and to the cost of collection and removal of such refuse, and to the cost of any and all other expenses incurred by the City in connection with such violation.

E. It shall be the duty of every tenant, owner or occupant of any building, place, or premises, to keep such premises in good condition as to refuse, and to remove or cause to be removed, all refuse, trash, or other material, which may be deposited on the premises of such building, place, or premises, in violation of this Ordinance. Any person, firm or corporation who fails to remove or cause to be removed, all refuse, trash, or other material, which may be deposited on the premises of such building, place, or premises, in violation of this Ordinance, shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$100.00 and to the cost of collection and removal of such refuse, and to the cost of any and all other expenses incurred by the City in connection with such violation.

F. Containers for refuse shall be of metal, or of other material, and shall be provided with a lid, which shall be kept closed, and which shall be fastened in such a manner as to prevent the escape of refuse therefrom. Any person, firm or corporation who uses a container for refuse which does not conform to the provisions of this Ordinance, shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$100.00 and to the cost of collection and removal of such refuse, and to the cost of any and all other expenses incurred by the City in connection with such violation.

G. Containers for refuse shall be placed in such a position as to be readily accessible by the Director of Public Works. The containers shall be kept filled with refuse, and shall be removed by the Director of Public Works, at such intervals as may be required. Any person, firm or corporation who fails to place such containers in such a position as to be readily accessible by the Director of Public Works, or who fails to keep such containers filled with refuse, shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$100.00 and to the cost of collection and removal of such refuse, and to the cost of any and all other expenses incurred by the City in connection with such violation.

H. It shall be unlawful for any person other than the collector or authorized officer of Birmingham, to deposit or cause to be deposited, any refuse, trash, or other material, on any street, sidewalk, or other public place, in violation of this Ordinance. Any person, firm or corporation who deposits or causes to be deposited, any refuse, trash, or other material, on any street, sidewalk, or other public place, in violation of this Ordinance, shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$100.00 and to the cost of collection and removal of such refuse, and to the cost of any and all other expenses incurred by the City in connection with such violation.

I. Waste may be disposed of by industrial, sanitary, or other means, when authorized by the Director of Public Works. Provided, however, no garbage shall be buried within 200 feet of any street, sidewalk, or other public place, and then only by express consent of the officer of public works, where buried.

Section 4. A. The Director of Public Works shall be authorized to enforce this Ordinance, and to take such action as may be required for the public collection of refuse.

in the various sections of the city. Provided, however, that such schedules shall provide for collection such weeks as may be necessary for the collection of refuse within the separate limits of said city except those portions thereof required by other Ordinances of the City of Birmingham.

Section 2. A. The City Commission of the City of Birmingham shall by resolution have the power to adopt a schedule of fees for the removal of refuse of all kinds, and such schedule shall be collected from the persons responsible for the removal of such refuse in the same manner as are provided in this Ordinance. The same schedule of fees shall cover the costs of removal of this Ordinance, and the same may be changed from time to time as conditions may require by resolution of the City Commission.

Section 3. A. Any person who shall violate any provision of this Ordinance, or who shall be responsible for such violation, shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$100.00 and to the cost of collection and removal of such refuse, and to the cost of any and all other expenses incurred by the City in connection with such violation.

Section 4. A. The Director of Public Works shall be authorized to enforce this Ordinance, and to take such action as may be required for the public collection of refuse.
