An electronic "super eye" is being used by some large food processing manufacturers to check the texture of ingredients and guarantees the same smooth texture from every bride's mixing bowl.

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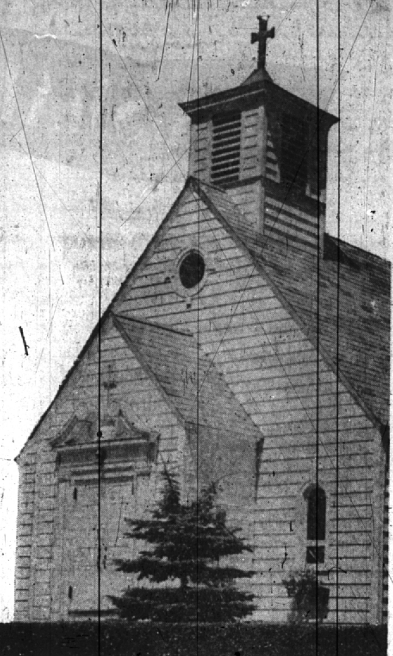
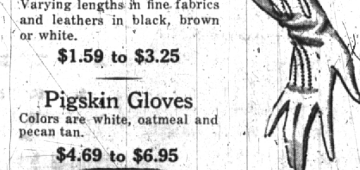
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
