

Edgewood Country Club Gets Many New Features

Looking more and more like a Birmingham project each day, the newly remodeled Edgewood Golf and Country Club on Commerce Road is nearing completion.

Charles Rose, for many years a resident of Birmingham, and owner of the golf club, has announced the signing of James M. (Jimmy) Anderson as professional at the club. Anderson has also been a resident of this city for a long while and lives on Southfield road.

Jimmy, as he is more familiarly known among his many friends, is a true Scottish golf pro, having learned his trade on the golf course in his native land. He came to America in 1921 and was one of the leading professionals in the Detroit District from that time

until he retired from the business in 1942.

14 Years at Pine Lake

Although he has been the pro at several clubs in this area, he is most generally associated with Pine Lake Country Club where he served for 14 years. He was also at Birmingham Country Club from 1922 to 1927. His acceptance of the Edgewood position is on a part-time basis and he will be at the club weekends and on holidays. He will continue to hold down his regular position as expeditor for a Detroit construction company.

Jimmy has always been noted for his teaching ability. Two of his most responsive students are his sons, John and young Jimmy, who are both expected to hold down positions on the Baldwin High School golf team this season.

Many Other Changes

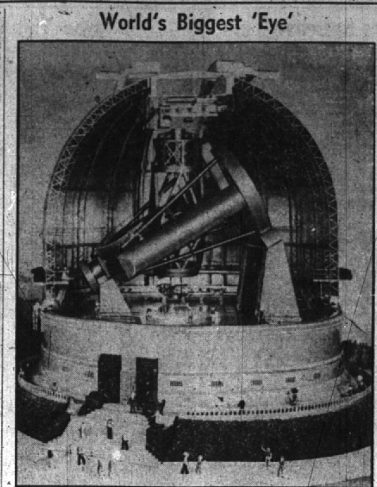
Rose has made many other changes at the club for the coming season, including the addition of a new men's locker room and grill room. The new locker room is a Detroit District from that time

complete with a new tiled shower room.

Also new is the pro shop which has been added to the southeast corner of the old building and is finished off in knotty pine. These new additions along with all the rest of the club house have new fluorescent lights and fixtures. The floor has been covered with asphalt tile.

A new room for the ladies is another feature of the remodeling. The main dining room has been all rejuvenated and the addition of a soda and sandwich bar will greatly facilitate service there. The kitchen has been rearranged and newly equipped throughout.

Changes on the golf course itself have been many, including the rebuilding of all traps and hazards. Work has been started on the construction of a practice tee and chipping green.
