As Governor of the great State of New York, he has and is doing a fine job; one of the great helps he has to attain this record is the high type of men he has surrounded himself with in Albany.

He was very friendly to Sliger; both, you recall, rose to their present high public offices because of their individual success as grand jury grant prosecutors.

So, as the weeks roll on toward next summer, you'll be reading more about the Dewey bid for Presidential candidacy — with Gov. Sliger holding an important place in the votes of the Michigan delegation when the States select the next Republican standard bearer.

### Texan Appointed to Cranbrook Sculpture Faculty

William M. McVey, since 1939 assistant professor of the Art Department at the University of Texas, has been appointed to the sculpture faculty of the Cranbrook Academy of Art in Bloomfield Hills, according to an announcement by Zoltan Sepeshy, director of the school.

Having studied in Paris, at the Rice Institute and the Cleveland School of Art and as a former faculty member of the Rice Institute, Houston Museum of Art, Western Reserve University and the Cleveland Museum, McVey has executed a number of pieces of sculpture now owned privately and publicly.

Some of his best known work includes the Commande, for the Federal Trade Commission Building in Washington, the central figure in the Gray Memorial Gardens in Cleveland, Gray Douglas, at Wade Park, Cleveland, and the monument to James Bowie at Texas Park, Texas. The monument to Dave Crockett at Brown, Texas, and the plaster relief at the Houston Post Office.

Awarded Commissions  
At the national sculpture show at Pomona, Calif., he was awarded the first purchase prize, and in national competitions conducted by Sections of Fine Arts in Washington, he was awarded four commissions.

A fellowship was awarded him at the Research Studio at Maitland Fla., and he received a sculpture grant at the Texas State Art Center. In national competitions, he has also been selected to serve as juror in the Fine Arts in Washington.

During the war, McVey wrote the recognition texts used by the rank of Major, he was Assistant Operations Officer, Far East Air Force in New Guinea, Leyte, Luzon, Yakama and Okinawa.

With Mrs. McVey, he will reside at Cranbrook after September 15.

ed court and prosecution procedures," Hamm said.

The IACP traffic division would, if desired, review the traffic code of the city or cities and make recommendations designed to bring it into conformity with the model traffic code developed by the National Committee on Uniform Laws.

"The organization and operation of the municipal court will receive the same attention," Hamm explained.

Will Train Officers  
It would cost the city an additional \$2,500 to have a traffic engineering consultant make a traffic engineering study on the administrative law, but would depend entirely on the outcome of the preliminary report.

Egbert said that the police training program would enable all police officers to receive the same instruction and develop proper law enforcement.

If he undertakes the IACP program, it will not be necessary for the city to send one policeman each year, at a cost of about \$300 each, to Northwestern Traffic Institute, as he has planned to do," Egbert pointed out.

Egbert indicated that the City of Royal Oak already has expressed its desire to cooperate in the regional plan.

Egbert said he wants to contact other communities before holding further discussions with the IACP.
