

Will Participate In Nat'l Pistol Matches in Ohio

Joseph Nikolen, 27720 Kackham, Birmingham, in on his way to Camp Perry, Ohio, to make his bid for the National All-Around Pistol Championship at the 63rd annual meeting of the National Rifle and Pistol Championships.

Nikolen is one of the 600 pistol marksmen of the country who will try to dethrone Harry Reeves, Detroit, Mich. policeman and National Champion since 1946. Reeves will be defending his title for the third time.

Actual competition for the title will get underway on the huge range on Tuesday, August 12th, and last through the 16th.

Oakland County RED CROSS NEWS

Marshall Smith, chairman of the Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, announces that word has recently been received within the Local Chapter that the American National Red Cross will institute a national blood program which will provide whole blood and plasma to anyone in need of this treatment.

The decision to provide this service was made by the National Red Cross Board of Governors after serious consideration of the plan which included consultation with chapter chairmen in all parts of the country.

In this program, any healthy person in the United States may give blood and any one in need may receive it. Many will do so. There will be no charge by the Red Cross for the blood, the only charge being made by the physician or hospital administering the blood.

Smith states that the program will develop gradually and it is not yet known when the local chapter will participate. In the meantime, the blood donor committee of which Harry Hoey of Cranbrook is chairman, will continue to cooperate with the Michigan Department of Health in the blood plasma program.

That part of the program which deals with collecting blood will operate substantially along the same lines as the wartime blood program, with established blood donor centers and with mobile units to cover outlying communities. Red Cross chapters will assume the important responsibility of enrolling blood donors. Many volunteers will be necessary to assist with the program.

Last Polio Health Hint: Avoid Sudden Chilling!

Sudden chilling such as plunging into cold water on a very hot day should be avoided as the sixth and final health precaution that should be observed in the polio season—June through September—the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis cautions through its local chapter.

Scientific research financed by March of Dimes funds has shown that when laboratory animals exposed to the polio virus were suddenly chilled, twice as many developed acute and paralyzing attacks of the disease as did a control group which had been protected from sudden temperature changes.

Therefore, take no chances. To be on the safe side avoid sudden chilling, the National Foundation advises.

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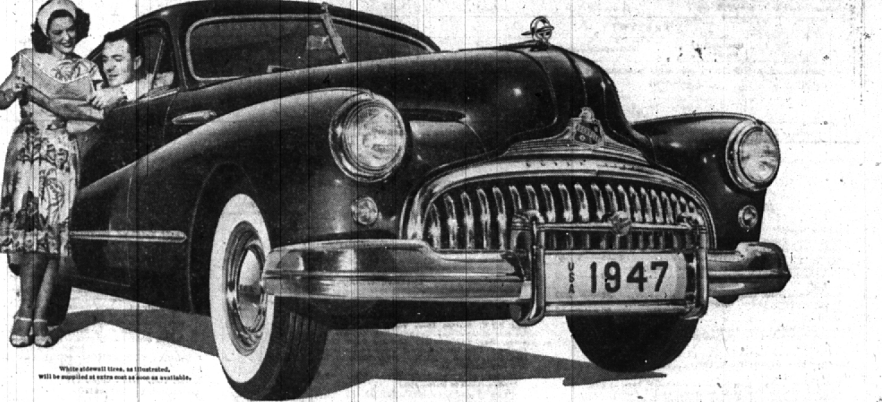
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Tip from the Smart Sex
