neckline and shoulders. The full skirt fell in a cathedral train. Her bouquets was of white bud-diea and carnations.

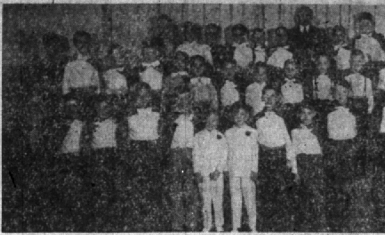
