To Appear in Concert Here February 24



Julius Chajes, eminent composer and pianist, and his wife, Marguerite Kozenn, dramatic soprano, will appear on the final Community Program Series as guest artists in their "Music of Nations" program.

On Monday evening, February 24, the final Community Program Series will be presented at the Community House at 8:30 p.m., featuring Marguerite Kozenn and Julius Chajes, assisted by Emily Mutter Adams, who is in the first violin section of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, and Jacob Becker, cellist with the Symphony.

Marguerite Kozenn was born in Rumania and sang in Europe's foremost opera houses before making her American debut in New York's Carnegie Hall as soloist with the New York Philharmonic and the Schola Cantorum in 1940.

She and her husband, Julius Chajes, appeared in Europe last summer in concerts and radio programs and plan to return there this spring for more appearances. Her repertoire includes twenty-six operas and many German lieder, in which she has excelled.

Julius Chajes was born in Pemberg, Poland, where at the age of nine years he performed his first piano recital. At 13 he wrote his first string quartet and in 1933 won honor prize at the first international competition for pianists in Vienna.

His cantata, "The One-Hundred Forty Second Psalm," for solo, chorus and orchestra, was performed at the New York World's Fair in July, 1939. Chajes made

his American debut in New York Town Hall in 1938 and played over a major radio network.

The "Music of Nations" program was given by Mr. and Mrs. Chajes at the New York Town Hall last year, and they have also just completed a six weeks' tour of the South, East and middle West.

Serving as ushers at the performance will be Nancy Allen, Phyllis Bartholomew, Sally Kemp, Laura Lou Raymond, Josephine Spike, Clara Gordon and Patricia Shiner.
